CIF-SS COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES October 14, 2004

The October meeting of the CIF-SS Council was called to order by John Dahlem, President, at 9:07 a.m. on Thursday, October 14, 2004, at The Grand in Long Beach. All leagues were present with the exception of the Arrowhead, At-Large Dr. Brennan, At-Large Dr. Mendoza, Christian, Harbor Mulholland, Valley and Victory.

1. ADOPT AGENDA – It was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the agenda.

2. MINUTES – It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Council meeting of April 29, 2004. Additionally, minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting of September 29, 2004, are submitted as an informational item.

3. SPECIAL PRESENTATION – John Dahlem, President, introduced Distinguished Service Award recipient Hall Harkness, retired Commissioner L.A.U.S.D. and CIF State Rules Interpreter.

4. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION – Stan Granch, representing MaxPreps, reviewed the process for member schools to contribute statistical information to their service.

Bob McGuire – CIF-SS Track Event Manager, addressed the Council regarding timely return of entry forms for CIF-SS track playoffs.

5. BASEBALL ADVISORY COMMITTEE PROPOSAL – Mickey McNamee, Baseball Advisory Committee Representative, reviewed a proposal which would waive Rule 3219 to allow a change in baseball playoff groupings.

Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal.

6. BASEBALL ADVISORY COMMITTEE PROPOSAL – Mickey McNamee, Baseball Advisory Committee Representative, reviewed a proposal to add a seventh division to the baseball playoff grouping for 2004-06. Following discussion it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal.

7. SOFTBALL ADVISORY COMMITTEE PROPOSAL – Scott Raftery, Softball Advisory Committee Representative, reviewed a proposal which would waive Rule 3219 and add a seventh (7) division to the softball playoff groupings for 2004-06. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal.

8. CIF STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS – Earl Haugen, President-Elect, presented the following non-action item which will be an action item on the February Federated Council agenda:

a. Add amendment to the State CIF By-Law 1702, Individual Entries to State cross country meet.

9. CIF-SS COMMISSIONER'S PROPOSAL – im Staunton, Commissioner, reviewed a proposal which would clarify the membership status of new schools. This will be an action item at the January 20, 2005, CIF-SS Council meeting.

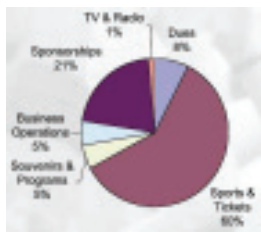
SOUTHERN SECTION MARKETING UPDATE

MARKETING SUPPORT PROVIDING \$500,000+ PLUS FOR MEMBER SCHOOLS

So what does marketing (or 'sponsorships' as more commonly referred by) mean to my school?

Last year, the CIF Southern Section generated more than \$500,000 from a various marketing agreements. That income represents more than 20% of the Southern Section operating budget. Of that income, 20% is from our title sponsorship with Toyota, 20% is from our ball agreements and 10% is from our other partnerships.

Directly for your school, this revenue saves an average \$920 per school. Or, if divided by student, a school of 1,500 students is saving approximately \$1,100 per year and a school of 3,500 is saving \$2,500 per year.

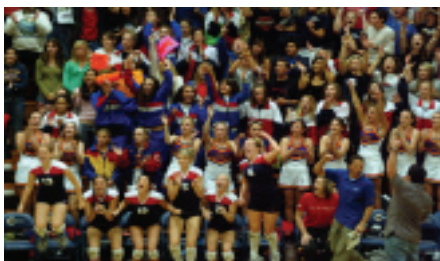


From a section standpoint, the ability to offer marketing sponsorships and gain revenue from those efforts enables the Southern Section to offer the best possible venues, awards, championship apparel to the winners and many extra benefits that would otherwise have to be eliminated. COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

Where have our fans gone?

High school sports, by many objective measures, are a vibrant and growing enterprise. The number of students participating, the number of sports offered, the range of opportunities increases every year. Options for female athletes are expanding in schools throughout the state, and certainly our Section. Surveys by the National Federation confirm that student participation in athletics is growing. The number of fans and supporters who show up to enjoy our athletes, however, is not keeping pace.

We have graphed the number of spectators who attended our football finals for the past 10 years. From a high of 25,795 in 1994 to 8,638 to this year, we have seen a gradual decline in the numbers who show up at our championship events. The same can be said for our other championship sports. Now it can be argued that 8,000 spectators for a Division VI football game is a healthy number, but you don't have to go back too far to see games with double that attendance number.

What does this mean? Is it significant? Does it affect how we look to the future?

From our perspective the most significant factor in dwindling attendance is that our students are missing an important part of the high school experience; cheering for their home school athletes; bonding with friends, forming an attachment with the high school. We know that associating with and supporting a school is important in overall academic achievement. We can't all be athletes. For those who are not there plenty is to be gained from attendance at games. This erosion of support tells every principal that his/her students are finding other things to do on Friday night.

In terms of student body assets, the lack of participation means that ASB funds shrink, thereby limiting opportunities for dances, assemblies, speakers and clubs. For CIF

**Controlling
Emotions**

Our previous column focused on preparation- conditioning, study and the overall anticipation of the first contest. As we enter the spring, games are underway and competition is at its highest level. As the intensity of games increases, so do the emotional factors that are a part of all play.

As administrators, coaches, players, parents, fans or officials, the issue of emotion is a vital factor. All participants need emotion- the positive spirit of fair play and competition that makes sports a rewarding learning activity. Positive emotion makes the player dive for a loose ball or reach back to run faster. Positive emotion makes a fan cheer a good play by both teams. Positive emotion makes the official focus on duties, be in proper position, and handle tough situations with common sense.

The negative side of emotion brings out actions that typically are regrettable. Rough play, trash talk, baiting of opponents and lack of focus by officials resulting in poor judgment are often results of negative emotions. Making the game better and making the athletic experience better are not results of negative emotions coming in to play at athletic events.

Overall, officials do a better job when left to do their job. All of us are accountable and report to someone. This is true with officials also. The CIF Southern Section office provides a means for input on officiating, as do a majority of the local officials units. An evaluation of officials work requires many things, including knowledge of game rules and the ability to be objective. The evaluation process is objective and positive. All top level officials welcome feedback when done properly. Making your input work to better officiating also makes your game better.

3. ACTION SESSION –

A. CONSIDERATION OF BLUE BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP STATUS OF NEW SCHOOLS – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend support of the following two categories of membership: Full Unrestricted and Probationary for new schools, beginning with the 2005-2006 school year.

Commissioner Staunton presented information from the principal of St. Michael's Academy who agreed to drop their application for membership and to apply for multi-school teams status.

A. President John Dahlem thanked the Southern Section staff for business cards, photos and bags for the Executive Committee. He attended the Section 7-8 Meeting which was very informative and they also discussed the issues concerning concussions.

B. Treasurer Susana Arce informed the committee of the desire of members of the Executive Committee to have more information on financial issues. She said that all of the assistant commissioners as well as Thom Simmons did an outstanding job with their sports last year. The auditors will present the final report at the next Executive Committee meeting. The Finance Committee will meet on October 19th. Dues will be mailed on September 30th. They are 23 cents per pupil with sport fees being increased to \$25/sport. Susana also commended Finance Director Shirley Frazier for doing a wonderful job.

SPRING SPORTS RULE REVISIONS

As we prepare to start the 2005 Spring Sports Season I think it only proper that we take a moment to look at any rule changes for the new season.

The following are rule or changes or language clean-up that appear in the new NFHS rule books for 2005:

BASEBALL

Rule changes

1-3-4: Clarified the diameter of a wood bat.

1-3-5: Deleted rule due to its duplication in Rule 1-3-2.

1-4-6: Added the new NOCSAE standard requirement to face mask/guard products.

3-1-1: Clarifies a player is ejected per the substitution rule.

3-2-1: Clarifies when a coach is restricted to the bench/dugout area because of an improper uniform.

6-1-1: Modifies the balk rule with allowing the "turning of the shoulders" under certain situations.

Minor Editorial Changes

Diagram 2: Provided the correct dimensions of the diagonal sides of home plate.

1-4-4: Added the point that a manufacturer's logo should be visible.

4-4-3: Corrected a minor grammatical error.

Dead Ball And Delayed Dead Ball Table: Corrected a minor grammatical error.

7-3-2 through 6: Repositioned the Penalty section behind each of the articles.

8-1-1 Exc.: Added the rule reference for clarity.

10-2-3: Added that the player may also be restricted to the bench under certain circumstances.

SOFTBALL

Rules Changes

2-25-1g; 2-25-2: Deleted the reference of the ball not being higher than the batter's head from the definition of both a foul ball and foul tip.

2-36: Deleted from the obstruction rule that fielders may be about to receive the ball. Obstruction may be called unless the fielder is in possession of the ball or fielding a batted ball.

MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

November 10, 2004

The November meeting of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee was called to order at 1:03 p.m. by President John Dahlem at the C.I.F. Southern Section Office in Los Alamitos. All members were present, with the exception of Edna Herring and Susan Rainey.

1. ADOPT AGENDA – It was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the revised agenda.

2. MINUTES – It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting of September 29, 2004, as revised.

3. COMMUNICATIONS TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE – Commissioner Jim Staunton shared communications from Speed Castillo, Orange County Area Officials Liaison and Taharga Rasshan, Champions for Character award winner from Garey High School, thanking him for the Champions for Character luncheon.

4. 2003-2004 AUDITOR REPORT – Shirley Frazier, Director of Budget and Finance, and Roger Carmody, of Carmody and Meach, presented the 2003-2004 audit report.

5. ACTION SESSION –

A. STATE ACTION ITEMS – President-Elect Earl Haugen presented the following items...

1. Cross-Country Advisory Committee Proposal – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend support of the proposal from the State Cross-Country Advisory Committee to change Rule 1702, allowing for an expansion of individual entries into the State Cross-Country Championships.

2. CBED'S using 9-12 enrollment – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend support of the proposal to count CBED's numbers using grades 9-12.

3. Article 7.70G, Election Tie-breaker – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend support of the proposal to clarify how ties can be broken for elections to the State Executive Committee.

4. Request for a Waiver of Bylaw 1200 – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend support of the proposal to waive Bylaw 1200, requiring sections to adopt sports on the State C.I.F. approved list.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTION ITEMS -

1. Consideration of Blue Book Recommendations for Membership Status of New Schools – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend support for the proposal to have two categories of membership for schools who join the CIF Southern Section: Full Unrestricted and Probationary.

2. Southwestern League Proposal – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend support of the proposal to change the point of origination for mileage reimbursement for officials during regular season contests.

6. NON-ACTION SESSION –

A. STATE NON-ACTION ITEMS –

1. State Championship Football Bowl Proposal – A discussion was held regarding the CIF State Championship Football Bowl Proposal.

2. Bylaw 214 Revision Proposal – A discussion was held regarding the proposal to delete Bylaw 214.C.4 at the State level. The Southern Section has already deleted this rule.

3. Proposal to State Federated Council to amend Rule 1200.1 – A discussion was held regarding the proposal to amend Rule 1200.1, allowing sections to adopt sports when a significant number of their schools has adopted that sport.

4. Ejection Policy: State Championships – A discussion was held regarding the proposal to have a uniform ejection policy for State Championships.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION NON-ACTION ITEMS –

1. South Coast League Proposal on the Allen Bill – A discussion was held regarding the proposal to amend rules 211, 214 and 219 to allow for students who enroll, transfer or move to a school under the Allen Bill be given restricted eligibility. The Allen Bill allows for parents to request attendance for their student(s) in a school district where the parents are employed, regardless of the residence of the parents/students.

5. OLD BUSINESS –

A. Status of Lacrosse in the CIF Southern Section – Commissioner Jim Staunton led a discussion on the current situation with lacrosse in the CIF Southern Section and the possibility of lacrosse being implemented in the Southern Section by the spring of 2006.

B. Pursuing Victory with Honor Training One-Day Training – Commissioner Jim Staunton reported on the success of the Pursuing Victory with Honor one-day training workshop held at the CIF Southern Section Office on October 27, 2004.

6. NEW BUSINESS –

A. Consideration of membership status for the 2005-06 School Year – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to table the membership applications of Lakeside High School and Somis Academy High School.

B. Recommendations for Area Placement by the Releaguement Committee – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the recommendations of the Releaguement Committee for Area Placement, with the exception of JSerra High School's placement into the Orange County Area. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to refer JSerra High School's placement into the Orange County Area to the Releaguement Committee for further consideration.

7. REPORT SESSION –

A. President's Report – President John Dahlem reported on the Steroid Summit he attended and the State Federated Council Meeting he attended.

8-6 PEN 3; Appeal Procedures:19 Changed to add that the coach or any defensive player may make a defensive dead-ball appeal.

Major Editorial Changes

1-3-5: Identical compression now included among the specifications for softballs used for each game

1-4-2: Clarified that gloves/mitts may be a maximum of two colors unless judged to be distracting.

1-4-4 NEW: Added that gloves may not be designed or altered to create an adhesive, sticky, and/or tacky surface.

1-5-1: Clarified that the bat handle may be round or oval.

2-57-3, 3-3-2: Clarified that the coach must notify the umpire when the FLEX assumes a position on offense or the DP plays defense for the FLEX.

3-2-13: Clarified the requirements for casts, splits and braces.

Dead Ball Tbl PEN 18: Clarified that all runners are awarded one base when the ball becomes dead except when the caught ball is the third out.

Dead Ball Tbl ACT and PEN 19 New: Added a new situation and penalty for when the ball is intentionally carried, kicked, pushed or thrown into dead-ball territory.

8-2-12, 13: Deleted the references to double first base rules and moved them to guidelines behind the rules.

8-4-3 PEN 1: Clarified when an obstructed runner may be put out.

8-9-6 EXC: Added a new exception to describe if a courtesy runner is injured.

SPECIAL NOTE

1-6-6: Effective January 1, 2006, NOCSAE approved face mask/guards are required on all fast pitch batting helmets.

SWIMMING & DIVING

Rules Changes

1-3-15 & 16: Define a dive as beginning when the diver assumes a starting position and ending when the diver has passed below the surface of the water.

Rule 2: The NFHS does not perform scientific tests on any specific items of equipment to determine if the equipment poses undue risks to student-athletes, coaches, officials or spectators. Such determinations are the responsibility of equipment manufacturers.

2-7-2: When starting platforms are used, the minimum water depth for racing starts shall be measured from the end of the pool to a distance at least 16'5" (5 meters) from the end wall.

2-7-5: For pools, constructed after June, 2004, proper distance for placement of backstroke flags for 25 yard pools is 5 yards, and for 25 meter pools is 5 meters.

3-2-5: For relay events in all meets, the coach shall submit to the referee or the referee's designee, the name of the lead off swimmer for the relay, not later than the conclusion of the race.

4-6-2: Dual confirmation may be used for all meets.

4-6-3: Dual confirmation is recommended for relays.

6-4-1: When the referee determines there is a malfunction of the primary timing system, and determines the need for integrated back-up times, the back up times(s) shall be adjusted for the timing system difference before integrating them with the accurate primary times and determining the official times and order of finish.

8-2-5: In the individual medley, each section must be finished in accordance with the rule which applies to the style concerned.

TRACK & FIELD

Rule Changes

3-2-2: When meet limitations are more restrictive than NFHS Rule 4-2, the meet director shall announce the number of contestants who may represent a school and the number of events in which each contestant may enter and or compete. Delete: "in most instances, the state association has standards concerning those matters. When there are no statewide standards, the conference or meet director determines the regulations using the standards listed in Rule 4-2."

3-2-4t: By state association adoption, the games committee may designate the use of the 40-degree or 34.92-degree sectors in the shot and/or discus throw. 6-5-1, 6-4-5, 3-20-5

4-2-1: A contestant shall not be entered in more than four events, excluding relays.

4-3-1b3: Full-length track jersey and track shorts or body suit (one or two piece) issued by the school. (4-3-8).

3. The jersey and shorts or body suit (one or two piece) may have the school identification and the competitor's name.

8. Remove "body suits." (4-3-5, 9-6-1b, 1, 2, 3, 8)

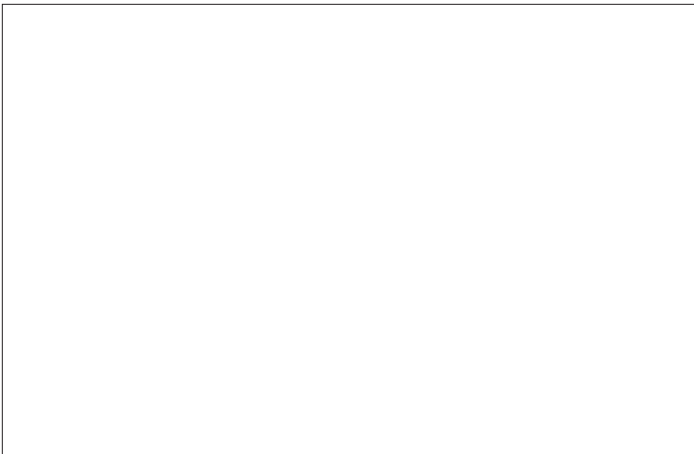

it means having to create new revenue streams in order to keep pace with rising costs.

The Executive Committee established a Finance Committee to work with staff to predict budget needs for the next five years. The secondary purpose was to determine if there are other viable means to increase income without imposing additional fees on member schools. We have had very productive meetings and established the following:

- o We would all benefit from increased attendance at games.
- o It is important to control costs to our schools.
- o There are viable ways to increase attendance and interest in our games.
- o We have a continuing need to increase income from sports in order to keep pace with rising costs in medical coverage and retirement.
- o The section has pared down costs and selected appropriate venues to realize as much as possible from our events.
- o Costs of awards and award programs must be covered so as to continue these valuable programs.

Additional income can be realized by exploring several options:

- o Find ways to create new and exciting match-ups between quality teams.
- o Explore ways to give schools revenue from television exposure during the regular season.
- o Offer attractive match-ups in some sports that generate revenue to both the schools and the Section, i.e. pre-season "Foundation Games" or "Extravaganzas".
- o Post-season regional championships.

We have a great deal of work to do before offering even one of these options to the Council. What is important is that the Section continues to examine every opportunity to deliver a quality experience for our athletes that boosts school pride and participation.

We'll work hard to realize that ambition.
